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Is it BULLYING or is it CONFLICT?

Bullying is a persistent pattern of unwelcome or aggressive behaviour that often involves an imbalance of power, and/or targeting someone with the intention to harm or humiliate them.

Conflict, on the other hand, is generally a disagreement or difference in opinion between peers who typically have equal power in their relationships. It can be ongoing. It's usually an inevitable part of a group dynamic.

Student Misbehaviour is actions or inactions of students that distract or take away from the positive learning environment that classroom teachers establish for learning in the class and interactions outside of the classroom. There are a variety of factors that contribute to student conflict and/or misbehaviour, but it mainly is the result of student impulsivity (reacting quickly to actions without much thought) <u>or</u> a personal skills deficiency (lacking certain skills to cope with a given situation).

As a school, we work with all students to support them in making positive behaviour choices, building their capacity in making right decisions, and developing their strategies for regulating their emotions or behaviour along with helping students grow their knowledge and strategies for dealing with a conflict. Regardless of the situation, we encourage/ask students to immediately seek help from an adult to help them through the process. If it is deemed to be a bullying incident/issue, we follow a clear process set out by Erase Bullying BC.

Snow made it's arrival on Monday but to the student's dismay disappeared in a day. With winter season now upon us, there will likely be more snow days ahead, turning our school grounds into a winter wonderland. On school days where snow falls, please have your child come wearing outdoor winter wear so they can play in outside on the fields and playground.
