Organization:	how well you keep your work, supplies and spaces organized; how prepared you come each	
	day ensuring you have all your learning materials	
Self Regulation:	how well you understand and manage your behaviour and your reactions to feelings and	
	things happening around you.	
Responsibility:	how well you do the things you are supposed to do, at level to which reflects the best of	
	your ability -you make smart choices, you are accountable for your actions and/or decisions	
Collaboration:	how well you work with others and provide you thoughts and input, but also listen to the	
	thoughts and input of others during group work and discussions.	
Independence:	how well you can work on a task for a given length of time on your own or with minimum	
	need for your teacher's or other adult's support.	
Initiative:	how well can you begin a task on your own, finding ways to show greater learning and	
	looking for ways to improve upon or extending your learning or understanding
